Trip Location	National Maritime Museum and Cutty Sark
Students visited the National Maritime Museum and the Cutty Sark in Greenwich. Students looked at Tudors and Stuarts Seafarers, Arctic Explorers and transatlantic slave trade routes. Fatima Dudhwala: I looked at European settlements in North and South America. Khadiza Rahman: Globes were used to locate local waters and for navigation- there was a long tradition in the islamic world of making globes.
