UNICEF activities by Secondary

The secondary students have been learning about child labour relating to UNICEF article 32:

- Article 32 (child labour) Governments must protect children from economic exploitation and work that is dangerous or might harm their health, development or education. Governments must set a minimum age for children to work and ensure that work conditions are safe and appropriate.



The students have created posters and presentations to show the effects of child labour and how we can protect children from child labour through their rights.

Some posters created by our secondary students:

Children that work, risk their safety taken away. Adults on the other hand, can take precautions and since their body is immuned to something, are in a lower chance of harming themselves comepared to kids. Kids however, don't understand the world around them and are much delicate with not much knowledge about their surroundings.

Child Labour

Article 32

What is Article 32-Child Labour?

Governments must protect children from economic exploitation and work that is dangerous or might harm their health, development or education. Governments must set a minimum age for children to work and ensure that work conditions are safe and appropriate.



Why should children be protected from working?

- Their family should have a good enough standard of living without them working.
- Children should be in education.
- Their health and safety should be protected.
- Children's views and best interests should be considered.
- Other harm could come to them in the workplace.
- It could lead to further exploitation or trafficking.
- They should have time to be a child and have all their rights.

When is World Day Against Child Labour?

12 June is the World Day Against Child Labour. There are 160 million children worldwide who are engaged in work which is harmful for their development and often means they can't access their rights to be safe, healthy and have an education.



Rights of a child:

Right to Survival:

- Right to be born
- Right to minimum standards of food, shelter and clothing
- Right to live with dignity
- Right to health care, to safe drinking water, nutritious food, a clean and safe environment, and information to help them stay healthy

Right to Protection:

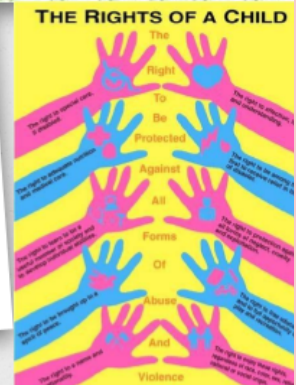
- Right to be protected from all sorts of violence
- Right to be protected from neglect
- Right to be protected from physical and sexual abuse
- Right to be protected from dangerous drugs

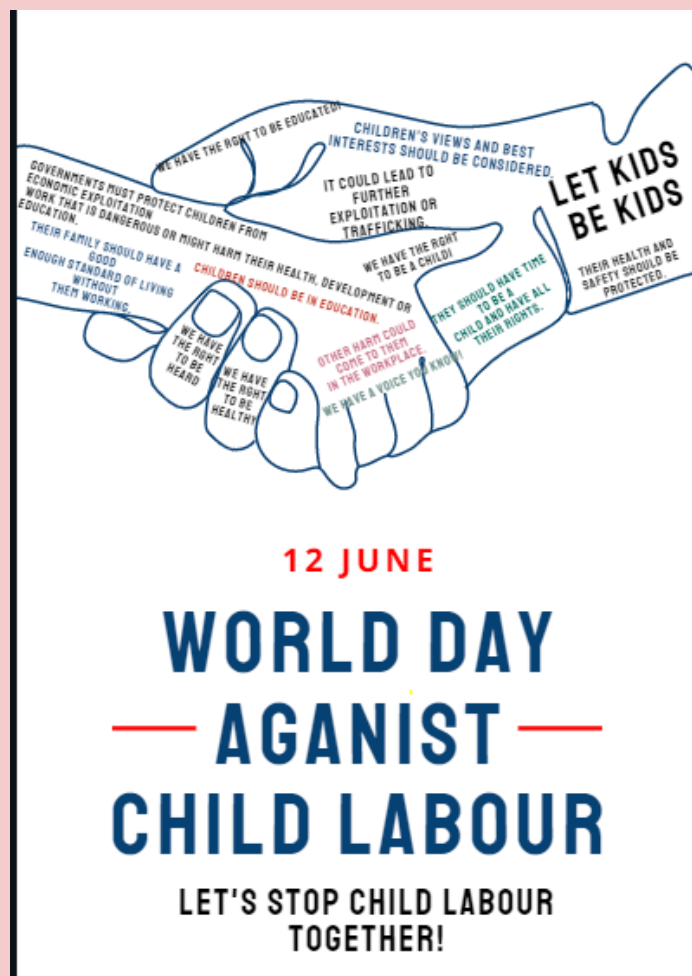
Right to Participation:

- Right to freedom of opinion
- Right to freedom of expression
- Right to freedom of association
- Right to information
- Right to participate in any decision making that involves him/her directly or indirectly

Right to Development:

- Right to education
- Right to learn
- Right to relax and play
- Right to all forms of development – emotional, mental and physical
