Assalamu Alaikum wa Rahmatullahi wa Barakatuh, dear Year 11s,

It is strange how quickly three years can pass.

I still remember standing in front of you as a new temporary teacher, uncertain of myself in many ways, yet excited to begin a journey. You were Year 9 then, and I had the privilege of teaching you Science. Back then, we explored the wonders of Allah's creation together—the stars, the cells, the forces that govern the world around us. We looked at the signs of Allah in the universe.

Little did I know that our journey would continue.

In Year 10 and Year 11, we exchanged microscopes for metaphors, equations for essays, and experiments for expression. We stepped into the world of English together, and what a beautiful journey it has been.

The students were awarded certificates for all their efforts and achievements and a trophy for the best overall coloured team.

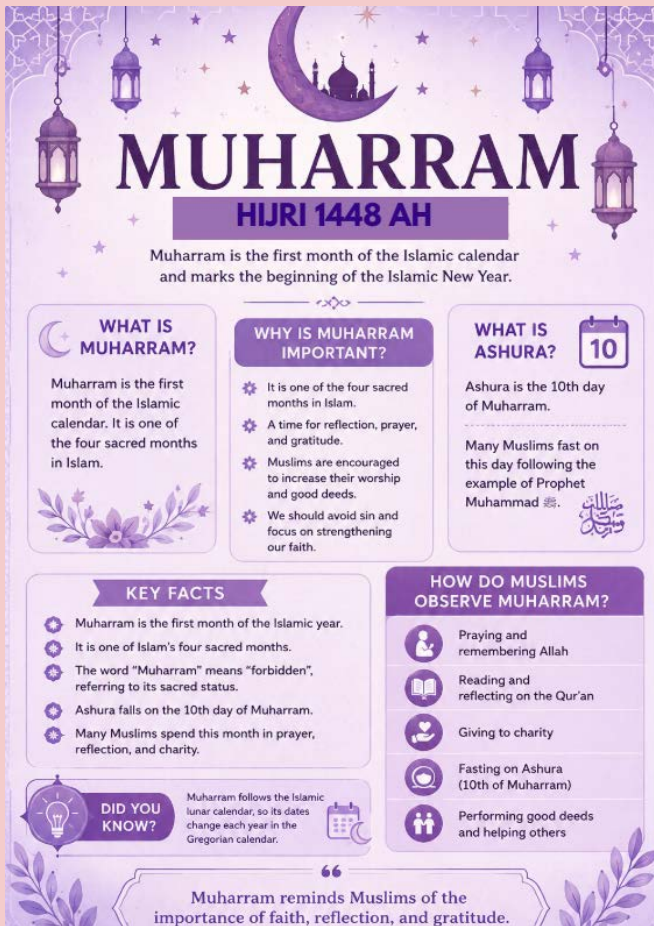
A huge well done to all the students who took part and JazakAllah Khair to the parents and teachers who showed support. Overall, it was a great experience for all!

- Many Muslims spend this month in prayer, reflection, and charity.

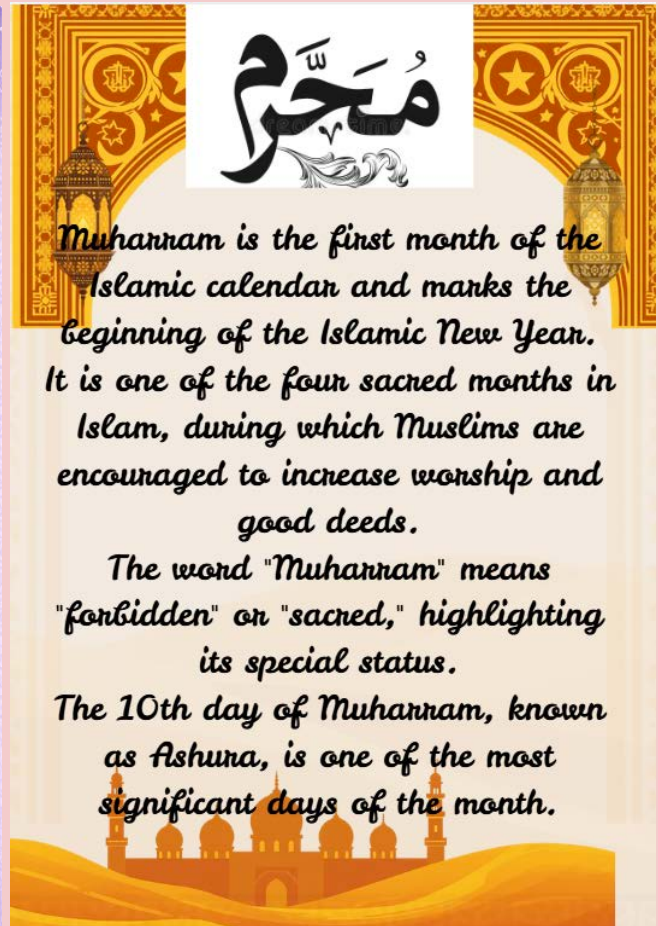
HOW DO MUSLIMS OBSERVE MUHARRAM?

The 10th day of Muharram, known as Ashura, is one of the most significant days of the month.



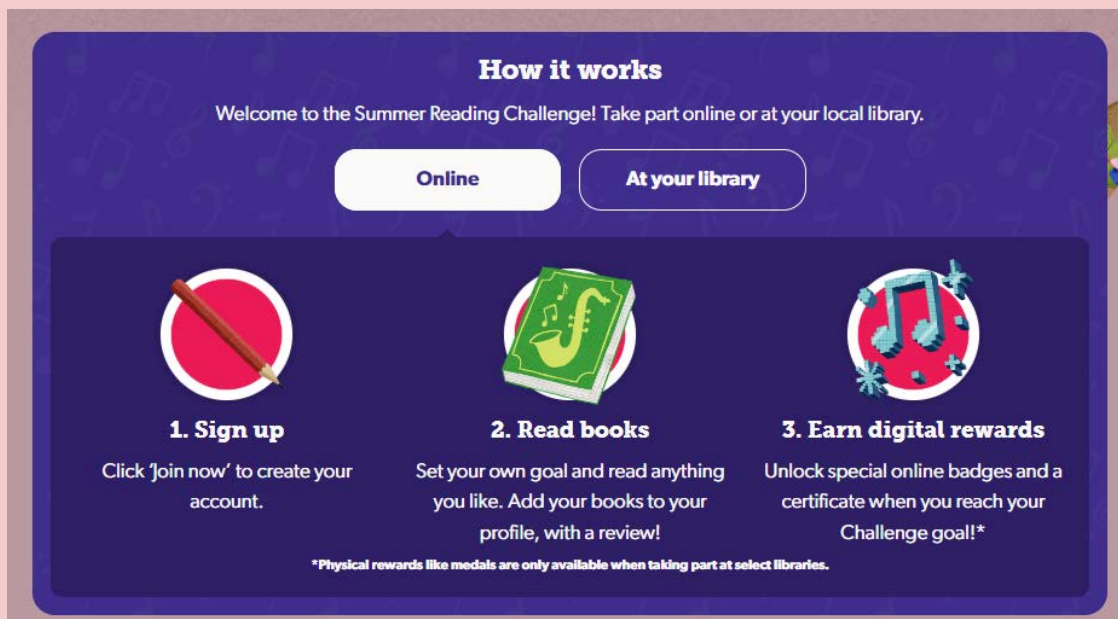
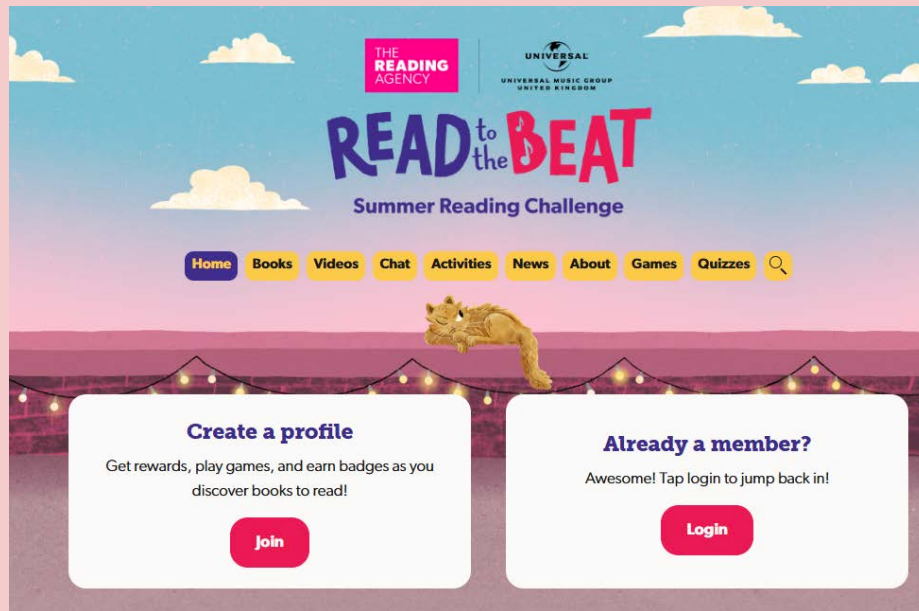

Young Muslim Writers Awards

The **Young Muslim Writers Awards (YMWA)** is a UK-based annual creative writing competition for children and young people aged **5–16**.
